
I grew up in a Christian home, raised by Christian parents. I was always taught that Jesus Christ was my Savior and how to live a Christian life. My parents divorced when I was about two years old. From then on, my

family all started to crumble. My older sister was diagnosed with depression, bipolar disorder, and adaptation disorder, so growing up I witnessed a lot of fighting.

At the age of thirteen, I started cutting myself. At first, it was just every so often, and then it started becoming more and more frequent. No one knew that I was doing this to myself for the first year or so. I was becoming suicidal and attempted suicide four times. On the fourth time, I overdosed on 236 pills and ended up unconscious in the hospital. The doctors told me I was lucky to still be alive. About a year later, I still found myself depressed and lonely. I was then introduced to weed, alcohol, and other drugs. I started getting into them very heavily and very fast. I started stealing, lying, destroying relationships, having sex with guys. I was turning into the person I always told myself I wouldn't be.

self-confidence. I have changed my outlook on my whole life. I now realize that I was put in this world for a reason. I realize that I can do anything I set my mind to. I realize that God kept me alive through everything as a meaning of His love. I plan to travel the world to visit all the foreign, less fortunate countries to give them hope for their lives. I want to spread the Word of God with them. I am now so excited for my life and my future that I never thought I would have.

Headlines that are common in Indiana.

Drug overdoses have become the leading cause of injury deaths in Indiana. One solution to the problem is here in the Wabash Valley. Lives are being transformed and set free from drug and alcohol addictions through the ministry of Teen Challenge. Since 1958, when Teen Challenge first got its start, helping teens in the streets of New York City, many things have changed with this global organization. It is a powerful tool now used by men and women alike, youth to adults, not just teens. The centers provide in-house care for those who need a breakthrough in their lives.

Faith-based instruction is key to the success of Teen Challenge centers, with terms usually 12 to 15 months in length. There are some centers that take mothers with children, and others that address family units. For a complete listing of centers go to teenchallengeusa.com.

With Teen Challenge's high success rate many choose to go this faith-based route as opposed to secular programs. The program is designed to truly help set the captives free. Wabash Valley Teen Challenge in Terre Haute has been doing just that for eight years in its men's division center. Students participate in devotions, Bible classes, life skills classes and work duties; and attend church services, TC chapels and prayer time. They are educated on morally upright behavior and learning to deal with situations in life, without running and turning to drugs as an escape.

At Teen Challenge's recent Jonah fish fry at Fairbanks Park, the organization embarked on the first Freedom Jam concert. The other big event this year was the second annual banquet, in March at the Hulman Center. The keynote speaker was Nicky Cruz, a former gang leader in the streets of New York City and one of the first teens to get help through Teen Challenge. Cruz hosts rallies and speaks to gangs in rough neighborhoods, giving his testimony of a life saved and changed.

Many of the TC staff were once bound by addiction, but found freedom through surrendering at a Teen Challenge. Teen Challenge believes there is a better way of life — through the life-giving power of Jesus!
